


As usual though, whilst one of the aims of the day is to raise as much money as we can for these two very worthy charities, the other aim is for everyone to have some fun!

Parvovirus Alert



For a good many years, thanks largely to highly effective vaccination policies, Parvovirus was a rare disease. We had felt that the horrific scenes of rows of dying puppies was a thing of the past.

Recently however, we have seen several cases of Parvovirus in young puppies. Very sadly most of these cases have been fatal despite treatment.

Despite high profile campaigns, people are still tempted by the lure of a young puppy and are prepared to buy puppies via the internet, often meeting sellers in car parks with no paperwork and never seeing either mum or dad.

Many of these sort of puppies are simply being traded as goods by the sellers. They have often come from Welsh puppy farms, from unvaccinated parents and then mixed with lots of puppies before they reach you. If any one of those puppies was carrying Parvovirus, it is only a matter of a few days before your brand new puppy goes down with it and with no maternal immunity, their chances of survival are very poor.

Please never buy a puppy without seeing mum. By doing so, you are helping to perpetuate the terrible trade in puppies and run the very real risk of having your puppy become seriously sick within days of purchase. For more advice on how to choose and buy a puppy

Watching your new puppy die a slow and horrible death from parvovirus is soul destroying and with Parvo around in the area, we strongly encourage all clients to ensure that all dogs, whatever their age, are up to date with their vaccinations.

Raw Feeding - Seriously Risky



Feeding raw diets seems to be gaining in popularity, but there is a wealth of scientific evidence showing that there are serious risks to both our patients and clients from doing so. A recent study at Liverpool University showed that over half of dogs fed a raw meat diet contained a bacterium called E.coli that was resistant to a single antibiotic. This compared to just 17% in dogs fed a cooked meat diet.

Of even more concern however was the finding that 1 in 4 dogs fed a raw diet contained E coli that was resistant to 3 or more antibiotics and 1 in 3 was resistant to one of our more powerful antibiotics. This was 6 times more common than in dogs fed a cooked meat diet. The study concluded that "Raw-fed dogs may be a source of antimicrobial resistant E.coli for the household, representing both a potential public health and animal welfare issue". And if that wasn't enough, there is also an increased risk of Salmonella and Campylobacter infections, both of which can be transmitted to humans.

For these reasons alone, we advise all clients to feed a cooked diet, either canned or dry, but preferably of a super premium brand such as Hills, which are guaranteed to pose no infection risk to either you or your pet.

Cat Fur-Endly Waiting Area At West Meads Surgery



Our main West Meads reception area can get very busy at times.

Cats and dogs frequently don't mix and we recognise that cats can become stressed if they are waiting in close proximity to dogs, especially if the dogs are excited themselves. So, we have created a Cat Fur-Endly (get it?!) area at one end of our West Meads Reception where cats can escape the gaze and unwanted attentions of canine patients also waiting to be seen. The area is also intended to be used by other more timid species such as birds, rabbits and other small furries.

This is also the first phase in the development of AlphaPet as a recognised Cat Friendly clinic. New, larger specific cat friendly kennel accommodation is shortly to be installed and we also intend to introduce cat-only clinics in the near future. Watch this space!

Using human medicines for pets



Recently, we have seen a worrying trend with clients medicating their own pets with human drugs. This is an extremely risky thing to do without specific veterinary advice.

Whilst dogs and cats are mammals, just like humans, their reactions and tolerances to drugs, which are considered safe in humans, is extremely variable.

For example, most of the common over the counter human pain relievers fall into the category of non-steroidal anti-inflammatories (NSAIDs). Some dogs and most cats are significantly more sensitive to these drugs than humans and inappropriate use can result in serious gastrointestinal problems, kidney and liver failure, bleeding disorders and even death. Paracetamol, while not an NSAID is highly toxic to cats and we have seen a number of fatalities from this over the years.

Please avoid using human medicines for pets without veterinary supervision.


10% off Sunscreens for pets in July



Apparently, Bognor is the sunniest town in the UK. But it's not just us humans that can get sunburnt or get skin cancer as a result of too much unprotected exposure to the sun. Cats and dogs with pink skin, especially on the ears and nose, can also get burnt and suffer from cancers such as squamous cell carcinoma. Every year we see several cats with this form of cancer on the ears which often necessitates surgical removal of the ears to save their lives.

Pets with pink areas of skin exposed to the sun should have sunscreen applied in the same way as humans if they are going out in the sun. But human sunscreens are not always safe to be used on pets. Zinc oxide (often used in human sunblocks) is toxic to dogs. The good news is that there are specific pet sunscreens available which are pet safe and effective. At AlphaPet, we stock the Petkin sunscreen range of sprays, sticks and wipes and there is 10% off all these products during July. Pop in to AlphaPet and get your pet protected.

Tick alert



Ticks have always been a regular problem for many dogs and cats in the Chichester and Bognor Regis areas. We've known for a long time that some can transmit Lyme disease to dogs, but we have seen very few cases and indeed, we have seen more owners suffering from Lyme disease than their pets!

However, this may be about to change. This year, new species of ticks have arrived in the UK from the continent and with them has come a new disease - Babesiosis. The first reports were from Harlow in Essex where 4 dogs who had never been out of the UK contracted Babesiosis. One died and three were seriously ill. It is considered only a matter of time before this very worrying disease spreads to the rest of the country.

Treatment is difficult and prevention from tick bites is considered the best way forward. The good news is that there is a variety of effective tick treatments available, so if your dogs or cats are picking up ticks, please talk to us about the tick treatments available.

We also discovered he had a microchip and after a bit of further detective work, we finally managed to locate a very surprised but very happy owner. It turned out that Alfie had been missing for over 2 years!

No one has any idea where he had been for the last 2 years or how he came to end up at a house in Chichester, but it just goes to show that for any of us who have lost cats over the years, we should never give up hope, especially if they have been microchipped because one day they may just turn up at a vets and be able to be reunited with their original family for a fairy-tale happy ending!

Could your dog be a Life-Saving Blood Donor?



Like humans, dogs need blood transfusions from time to time, usually as an emergency. Unfortunately, there is no local blood supply service for dogs, so at AlphaPet, we maintain a register of dogs that are suitable for donating blood.

To be eligible to donate blood, a dog needs to be:

Between 2-8 years old and fit and healthy (so not on any regular medications)

Fully vaccinated and over 25kg

Regularly treated for lungworm

UK based and never having travelled, or come from abroad

We are always in need of more potential donors. If your dog meets the above criteria and you are interested in putting them forward, here are some further points you should be aware of.

- An AlphaPet patient could require a blood transfusion at any time of the day or night, so once on the register, your dog could be called upon at any time. We do however offer you the choice as to what time you wouldn't mind being contacted.
- Dogs require a light sedation in order for blood to be taken, so they receive a full health check prior to this to ensure they are fit to be sedated.
- The vast majority of blood donors go home the same day once the sedation wears off.
- A dog can donate a maximum of 4 times in one year.
- The whole process is free and as a thank you, your dog will receive an 'AlphaPet Hero' bandana and if you are not yet signed up to our Pet Health Club, we will be offering the first month's membership free of charge to dogs on our donor list.

Heat stroke in pets



Every summer we warn about the risks of heat stroke for pets, but every summer we still see cases all too frequently.

Dogs are still the most commonly seen patients. They have fur coats on which they can't take off. If they go charging around on a hot day, or they are confined in a house with no windows open, but the sun coming through, or they are shut in a car for even a few minutes in the middle of the day, they can very quickly overheat. Because of their coat, they then cannot cool down quickly enough and effectively cook from the inside out. Fatalities are frequent.

Please, never leave dogs in cars. Always make sure your pet can move to a cool part of your house. Avoid allowing them to exercise during the heat of the day.

But it is not just dogs that are at risk of heat stroke. Rabbits and guinea pigs confined to hutches in the garden are also at serious risk. They also have non-removable fur coats and their hutches can act like ovens on hot days. Please always make sure that their hutches are placed out of direct sunlight and make sure they have access to cool, shady areas. Heat stroke is a horrible way for any creature to die and it is completely avoidable.
